
The website is in the middle of major update, and there is a sign out front advertising the Sunday service on our website for any who passes by.

You are invited to step back in time, through an unfinished documentary by local filmmaker, Josh Gippin (the owner of Joshua Tree Productions). The movie tells of the cruel history of the poor elderly and those with disabilities lived in the mid-19th and early 20th century. It reveals how those housed in the Summit County Infirmary were treated and then discarded in unmarked graves, which now lie beneath a green space for residents to play. *The Forgotten Dead* strives to memorialize those who were marginalized in life and forgotten in death, by challenging us all to rethink our perceptions of the people around us living today with disabilities.

Her father, ble." William Jackson Smart, a Civil War veteran, raised six children as a single parent.

Not an Easy Task

On June 6, 1910, Dodd approached the Spokane Ministerial Association and the local Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA) with her petition outlining the idea for an annual observance and received overwhelming support. Spokane held its first Father's Day celebration on Sunday, June 19, 1910, with moving speeches from local ministers.

In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson celebrated the day by opening a church service in Spokane by telephone from the Oval Office. Mister Wilson liked the Father's Day idea so much that he pushed to make it a national holiday (he had just made Mother's Day official in 1915), but Congress feared the move would take support away from Mother's Day.

Undeterred. Dodd took her mission on the road and spoke publicly to fathers to gain their support. But she was met with While President Calvin hard criticism. Coolidge was willing to urge states to observe the day, he refused to issue an official proclamation.

In 1966, when the holiday efforts reached another stalemate in Congress, Senator Margaret Chase Smith penned a harsh memo declaring, "Either we honor both our parents, mother and father, or let us desist from honoring either one. But to single out just one of our two parents and

initial efforts, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Executive Order declaring Father's Day as a holiday to be celebrated on the third Sunday of June. But, it wasn't until President Richard Nixon signed an official proclamation, in 1972, that Father's Day became a federal holiday.
