

On our liturgical calendars, TRINITY SUNDAY faithful gathering of people

Sunday, May 30, is designated as Trinity Sunday, and as we look forward to re-gathering for our in-person services, the doctrine of the Trinity helps us in understanding the value of community.

Indeed, if in the Divine Community there is (as Trinitarian doctrine teaches us) no above and below, no superior or inferior, but only a society of equals who are different from each other but live together in mutual openness,

respect, and self-giving love, then any true human community should also mutually embrace people who are different in race, different in gender, different in socio-economic levels, different in political understanding, different in religious beliefs. If the deity of God is fulfilled in the community of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit (as Trinitarian doctrine teaches us), then a

created in the image of God is realized only in community, not in isolation from others or in resistance to others. If there is equality between Father, Son, and Holy Spirit within the

Divine Community (as Trinitarian doctrine teaches us), then in a truly human community and in the church, there is no place whatsoever for authoritarianism by any individual, gender, racial group, political stance, or religion.

There can only be the quest for a human society that reflects the free, open, egalitarian kind of society that Father, Son, and Holy Spirit have with each other and will for the world.

Therefore, as we re-assemble in our sanctuary for worship, let us model and demonstrate the virtues of a Trinitarian community.

Dear Members and Friends of New Covenant Community Church,

As I am writing this, our first in-person worship service in over a year is still in the future. So as you read this, you will be able to comment back on how you think it went. We are still figuring things out, trying to remember how things used to work, and making judgments about what to continue doing, what to dispense with, and what new things to try. "Brown-bagging" communion will be a first for me, and I suspect for a lot of other people, too. While we gather together as a community again, let's be sure we do not forget those who can't or won't be with us for whatever reason, whether it be health problems that keep them house-bound, not being ready yet for the health risk of exposure to the public, or for any other reason.

Many positive things have happened in the last month. Our mission garden is more completely planted now, to help less privileged members of our community have access to fresh produce through the Gennesaret food ministry. We are also considering a request from another church in the area for help with a monthly food outreach they have been engaged with for several years; we will have more to say about this as plans become clearer.

In spite of the limitations of doing the Hunger "Walk" as a drive-through event, our members and friends stepped forward in a big way. New Covenant donated \$3,700 (including \$300 from the Mission Committee budget, the rest from special contributions), as compared to a completely respectable \$2,385 contributed last year. Next year, we should be able to actually walk again for real. Imagine—a "walk" where we can actually come together and walk!

Our first book fair at Case Community Learning Center is now complete. We intend to continue our commitment to supporting learning and literacy in our community this coming fall with the book fair at Portage Path school as we have done for a number of years now.



Just as we supported the Hunger Walk and the Case book fair, I am truly impressed by how faithful our congregation has been in keeping up with its financial support. Even though we have not been passing a collection plate down the pews each Sunday, we have not only kept a strong budget supported by strong pledging, but as a congregation we have more than kept up with our pledges. Some members have already paid their full pledges for the year, and our accounts overall are in good shape to keep supporting the financial side of the work of the body.

New Covenant has continued to support the northwest Akron community by offering our building as a place to vote, most recently on May 4, when a library levy was on the ballot, and we have agreed to do so again in August, when there will be a special primary election for the seat in congress left vacant by Marcia Fudge, who is now the United States Secretary of Housing and Urban Development.

I am looking forward to meeting our new Interim Music Director Olivia Roberts, and experiencing her talents as they support our Sunday worship.

But even more, I am looking forward to being back together in one place in fellowship with our members. I'll see you there!

Our church with contributions from members, relatives of members, friends, and our Mission Committee, contributing an amazing \$3700, exceeding last year's record of \$2385! You stepped up big time to "Feed the Need." The AAIC and the Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank thank you for your generosity.



Total amount taken in from both Fairlawn and N. Canton, through checks, cash, checks, AAIC website (Fund Hero), and Facebook totaled \$33,402. 81. The amount also includes an AAIC match of \$5,000. The check, referred to as the "dummy check" will be presented on June 21 at the Foodbank.

Our Fairlawn Hunger Walk committee remains the same for 2022. However, after four years as chair, I am turning the reigns over to two well-qualified leaders from the Unitarian Church. Cathy King, I and New Initiatives will enthusiastically work on getting participation from NCCC in a real "walk" next year on May 1.
