NCCC & FIT Your Faith Innovation Team, FIT, the innovative program out of Pittsburg Theological Seminary to help us come to terms with the fact that we cannot be the same church we have always been, began mid-August 2022. By walking and driving we surveyed homes, businesses, parks, senior and disability housing, four elementary schools, and 10 churches of varying denominations. Currently, the Mission Committee works with two of those elementary schools, Case and Portage Path. We also have relationships that extend beyond the neighborhood with connections to Gennesaret, Akron-Canton Regional Foodbank, Akron Area Interfaith Council (AAIC) and Akron Interfaith Immigration Advocates (AIIA). Then we looked at who we are. NCCC has innovative worship services, widely attended fellowship events and is

mission oriented.

You, our congregation, helped create a timeline identifying the joys and disappointments we have experienced. Next, we examined all the information and started exploring ways to expand and deepen our existing relationships in a way that is consistent with our gifts and concerns. The opportunity came to us while our Mission Committee and volunteers were working at the

Portage Path CLC Book Fair.

Portage Path needs volunteers, and they can use our assistance in:

 Akron Reads Initiative – Volunteer tutors are needed to read to second graders. Training is provided via video. The Board of Education requires a background check, which is free to the volunteer. Ideally volunteers will commit to 1 hour per week for the school year (October through May). Portage Path CLC is willing to accept volunteers who will commit to 1 hour per week for 9 weeks.

If you are willing to make the commitment, please let a FIT member know.

(Background checks are completed

during the summer.)

 Family Events – These events are held at the end of the school day, once or twice per month. Our volunteers are needed to help pack "goody bags" and assist with distribution or other event activities. Most events are no more than 1 to 2 hours. Your FIT packed "Goody Bags" on May 18 and again on May 23.

This is a fun way to do something beneficial for the families and students at Portage Path. Watch for more information in the fall.

3) **Student Needs Closet** – There is an on going need for toiletries and basic clothing for the fourth and fifth graders; specifically, the boys need deodorant and the girls need feminine care products. We will learn more about these needs in the fall.

HURRICANES AND HUNGER

Where do our disaster relief offerings go? This is a brief description of the channels through which our offerings get to their intended destinations.

Every year disaster strikes somewhere in the world where people's lives are shattered. When a disaster strikes, as it did this past winter in Florida or will this week with a cyclone in the far east, the churches of North America will respond with disaster relief.

As a congregation, our contribution to those appeals takes two forms. We can send our support directly to the site of the disaster as we did a few months ago with the Peace Community congregation in Ft. Myers Beach, Florida, or we can pool our support with hundreds of other congregations through our two denominational affiliates, the Presbyterian Church, U.S.A. and the International Council of Community Churches.

Both the P.C.U.S.A. and the I.C.C.C. are partners in Church World Service, the primary resource for disaster relief of 37 Protestant and Orthodox Churches in North America. When our disaster relief offering is sent to either Church it becomes part of an even greater effort which has access to hundreds of resources and thousands of experts. The only way to be effective in the face of a disaster is with people who know what to do. And, the ecumenical church has the ability, with our support, to do just that: to purchase the supplies and expertise that will best serve the people whose lives are shattered by these disasters.

Finally, a brief history of Church World Service and the one disaster that never ends. That disaster is hunger! Everywhere in the world there are people who need food. The roots of Church World Service were planted in the heart of the Great Depression to meet that need. Grain farmers from the American Midwest founded what was called the Christian Rural Overseas Program (C.R.O.P.). They would offer the grain if the Churches across America would raise the money to ship and distribute their offering. C.R.O.P. is still at work today, supplying food across this country and around the world. The C.R.O.P. walk in Akron was the predecessor to the Hunger Walks which provided such a vital resource to the Akron Canton Regional Foodbank.

So, the short answer to the question, "Where does our disaster relief offering go?" is through the wider Church, at work together, it becomes part of a larger sum assembled by the P.C.U.S.A. and the I.C.C.C., collected to meet each and every disaster wherever it might occur.

CONGRATULATIONS, ROBERT ROTH

It was they who conveyed him to the hospital during his medical crisis and it is they who kept him focused on positive ventures. He counts budding engineers, software designers, entrepreneurs, and property developers of various ethnicities among his "band of brothers."

Robert worked throughout his college career. He tried out a variety of jobs, some requiring mostly brawn and others relying principally on brains. He was a landscaping assistant, a JCPenney retail associate, NCCC's official valet, and an intern for Akron Municipal Judge David Hamilton. Although he retains a few valued groundskeeping clients who pay well and on time, he has settled on less physically-demanding pursuits for his future.

In August, Robert will be taking his place among the University of Akron's law school students. He is hoping to specialize in contract law especially as it applies to software licensing and employment practices. The Akron courthouse, where he is now employed as a paid intern, has graciously offered to work around his school schedule during the academic year.
