



Resource Committee of Eastminster Presbytery

On October 18th, 75 volunteers, representing 13 congregations, showed up to help prepare for Warren Family Mission's



annual coat giveaway. Those in need receive a coat, hat, scarf, gloves/mittens, and a blanket! Last year, the Mission gave away over 800 coats, and they are hoping to surpass that this year.

In just two hours, volunteers set up racks and hung around 500 coats, sorted and organized hundreds of hats, scarves, gloves/mittens, and blankets.

The next opportunity to volunteer with for a project put on by the Resource Committee of Eastminster Presbytery will be a one-day workshop "Supporting Those We Love in the Last Season of Life," led by Rebecca McCurdy. The event will be held on February 9, 2026, at United Presbyterian Church, Cuyahoga Falls. More details will be shared later this month.
